The Luang Prabang Film Festival (LPFF) is pleased to release the lineup for its fifth annual event, which will take place 6-10 December 2014. As always, LPFF will celebrate the best cinema from across Southeast Asia, and create a space for regional film professionals and fans to network, dialogue, and encourage local film production. All screenings and activities of the festival are free and open to the public. In addition to these feature film screenings, LPFF will also have multiple short film programs, including all 18 Southeast Asian documentary films from [DocNet's](#) second [ChopShots](#) collection, as well as this year's [Tropfest SEA](#) finalists. Selections from the [Vientianale's](#) short film competition will also be shown. There will be multiple panel discussions, Q&As, a concert, and performances to entertain visitors during the festival.

Visitors can expect an update on the [Southeast Asia Movie Theater Project](#) (the director of which will be speaking later this month at TEDx in Chiang Mai, Thailand), as well as other film-related exhibitions on display.

In an exciting new partnership, [Major Cineplex](#) will be in attendance and one of the festival's films may be selected for theatrical distribution.

Coca-Cola is one of the festival's biggest sponsors once again this year, having also made a very generous donation to LPFF's Lao Filmmakers Fund, a publicly-generated fund that allows filmmakers in Laos to apply for grants to help realize their film projects.
